## Street Children: An alarming situation

There are more than 5,000 lonely children working and living on the streets in the urban area of Nepal.

About 500 children land up in the streets of Kathmandu alone each year from different districts of the country. An estimated number of 4,000 children are working as rag pickers.

## The Story of Raj Kumar and Hari Kumar

Raj and Hari are two beautiful boys, eleven and nine years old respectively. They are easy-going and easily adapted themselves rapidly to their new environment. Hari quickly made friends with Kirtiman, another boy of a similar age at the home and Raj Kumar's best friend is Buddhiman.



In the beginning of December 2002, Raj and Hari's mother brought her two sons to her parents' home and announced that she was going to re-marry. She then left Nepal to follow her new husband to India. As is often the case, she may well be sold into prostitution once in India.



At the beginning of January, Raj and Hari's grandmother asked us to take care of her grandsons. She loves them deeply but has still to take care of her 13 years old son and of her, usually drunk, husband. In addition they are very poor and live only on the vegetables they cultivate.

Raj and Hari went to school before coming to LBU, but their level was low and their English non-existent. Hari Kumar is now in Class I and Raj Kumar in Class II where he always ranks first or second.

## Education

In 2004, Nepal ranks 140<sup>th</sup> in the global Human Development Index (HDI). HDI takes into account three factors: life expectancy, school enrolment/literacy and income.

Nepal is one of the worst performers for its achievement in the primary education. The adult literacy rate is only 44%. The life expectancy at birth is 59.6 years and the GDP per capita is USD 1,370.

At LBU, we want to give the best chance to the children to achieve a good education in spite of the fact that most of them never attended school before LBU. We are progressively transferring them to a better school called Emerald Academy. This year Reshma, Buddhiman, Karishma, Som Bahadur, Krishna and Arjun are studying there and next year they will be joined by Suryaman, Raj Kumar, Kalpana, Binita and Mina.

All the children really like to make their homework in the study room where we have now two computers thanks to a donation from Standard Chartered Nepal. They also are very happy with the new aquarium donated by one of our sponsors. We formed 4 groups and each of them has to take care of the fishes during one week. We want to develop their sense of responsibility. Should one fish die, they will have to buy another one with their pocket money.

I also spent most days supervising their homework and also practicing conversational English with them and they are improving on a daily basis some quicker than others.

The children always enjoy outings and a few days before my departure I treated all the children and staff to a day trip and picnic to Karkani in the hills. We hired a bus and driver and had a fun day playing games and enjoyed a delicious picnic and the ended with everyone singing on the way home! It was a wonderful way to end my enjoyable stay at LBU.
